First Thoughts ...

When I was first ordained and licensed as curate to the Parish of St Lawrence Alton (long before we were The Parish of the Resurrection) one of the first things Peter Doores, the then vicar, told me about was the services and people we met at The Brendoncare Nursing Home. There was one particular instruction that went along with this - "and the Bishop has particularly asked us to keep our eye on Chad Varah - you'll find him in Room 314." That sounded to me like an interesting name but I am afraid it meant nothing to me. So I went home and 'googled' it only to discover that Revd Chad Varah was the founder of The Samaritans.

What was he doing in a nursing home in Alton? It turns out his daughter lived locally and he had become quite confused. So diligently I went to visit him and offered him Holy Communion as I had just taken the service in the communal lounge. His riposte I will never forget - "My dear boy, if I want communion I will do it myself!" He had photographs of himself and royalty and celebrities all over the walls and I managed to engage him over my several visits in his extraordinary life and ministry.

This month, 2nd November, sees the 70th anniversary of the very first phone call to the Samaritans.

The idea for a confidential crisis phone-line that desperate people could use came from the Chad Varah, following the suicide of a young girl of 14 in one of his parishes. He was appalled by the senseless loss of life, and the idea of offering help to those in such need was born. When he moved to St Stephen's Church Walbrook in the city of London in the summer of 1953 he knew the time had come for him to launch what he called a "999 for the suicidal". He was, in his own words, "a man willing to listen, with a base and an emergency telephone."

The first ever call to the new service was made on 2nd November 1953 – and hence this date is recognised as the Samaritans' official birthday. The service received lots of press coverage and on 7th December 1953 the Daily Mirror coined the term "Telephone Good Samaritans". Although Samaritans is not a religious organisation, the name has stuck and become synonymous with the idea of people being there for others struggling to cope and I am sure from the Gospel story told by Jesus 'The Good Samaritan'.

From that first phone call in the autumn of 1953 the workload increased so rapidly that Chad Varah had to turn to volunteers for help. Soon he said that "they were doing the clients more good than I was." It was in February 1954, that Chad Varah officially handed over the task of supporting the callers to the volunteers. Samaritans as we know it today was born.

This country is full of caring and loving organisations and charities founded on Jesus' stories or a Biblical perspective. We should be glad that people have found such inspiration and I am glad that Chad eventually allowed me to give him his communion.

Chad is just one of the amazing and inspirational people I will be bringing to mind in this November season of remembrance. We have held our pojgnant All Souls Service where so many people have been named and remembered in prayer and we will be joining with many others to hold our Remembrance Services on 11th and 12th November. These are very special occasions. This year on Remembrance Sunday Revd Philip Simpkins and I will also be leading a Service for Peace at 6pm in St Lawrence — a quiet, simple vigil style service. With so much violence, tragedy and war in our broken war this seems very apt and I invite you to come along.

Charity Giving

The PCC have been given some very serious thought to how, as a Parish, we support charity and mission agencies. We would like to put a more systematic system in place. This was also discussed at this year's APCM and in other places and we have listened carefully.

It has been agreed that in 2024 we will give 5% of all regular giving to 4 charities or mission agencies and then also ask that other events and activities support them as well. We will look at our budgets but would like to raise this percentage figure to 7.5% in 2025 and then 10% in 2026. We would also encourage other ways to support these charities. We will look to support these chosen charities for a 2/3 year period recognising that regular and ongoing gifts are good for their own budget setting and work. It would be appropriate to think of support for local, national and international organisations.

So, we would like some help in determining which charities/mission agencies to support. We have come with simple criteria:

- Christian based/founded or supportive of Kingdom values
- An ease of building relationship/partnership with the organisation
- People/families within the parish who can act as natural advocates to keep us informed
- An ability to be able to invite speakers and receive regular communication from the organisation
- An inter-generational appeal can all-ages find ways to engage and support

Would you be able to nominate a charity or mission agency? If so, would you please write a brief paragraph synopsis based on the above criteria for The Ministry Team to consider - send it to the Parish Office by email or note by the end of November. They will then put a proposal to the January 2024 PCC meeting for consideration. At that meeting there will be a full written policy presented so that we have a basis for review and consistency.

As well as the chosen charities we will continue our regular support for Karamoja, The Anna Chaplaincy and Youth & Children's Ministry. Also we would always encourage local practical support for local charities and organisations as we know is so prolific amongst our worshipping communities.

We will ensure we always make good use of Gift Aid possibilities.

We look forward to your ideas, and support of this way forward.

Sunday Evenings at 6pm St Lawrence Church

We are making some regular changes to our Evening Services across each month.

Week 2

A time of prayer for the parish, our community and nation interspersed with Bible readings and reflective songs. There will be space to share ideas for prayer and then time to pray quietly or altogether. 'Be still and know that I am God' This replaces the Saturday Zoom prayers. It lasts about 50 minutes.

Week 3

Choral Evensong service from the Book of Common Prayer. This service is led by the choir who sing a psalm, Magnificat, Nunc Dimittis and an anthem. There are traditional hymns accompanied by the organ. There are also two Bible Readings, a short sermon and prayers of intercession. It typically lasts about 50 -60 minutes and occasionally we end with 'drinks and nibbles'.

Week 4

Informal Evening Service - an informal service led by a group of people who plan it together. The music is led by a small band and we sing a variety of contemporary worship songs. It contains teaching, open prayer, 'Talking Jesus' discussion and times of sharing. It lasts about 60 minutes. For October and November we will look at 'The Church in Harmony' and the Book of Colossians. Come and come and relax in the Lord's presence and meet with Him afresh.

Eco Corner

Having owned several historic vehicles, I was fascinated by the results of a survey by the Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs.

"The number of historic vehicles on the DVLA database has increased to 1,241,863.

9.8m people in the UK are interested in historic vehicles.

Average distance covered by an historic vehicle is 2,214 miles per annum.

21m people see historic vehicles as an important element of the UKs heritage.

11.3m people think historic vehicles should be exempt from restrictions of low and ultra-low emissions imposed on other vehicles.

5.1m people are interested in owning an historic vehicle.

60% of owners say owning an historic vehicle is one of the most important things in their life."

So, whether it is a Morris Minor, an Austin Seven or the original Rolls-Royce Silver Ghost, the general public would like to see such vehicles maintained and used on public roads. So, what do we do when there is no petrol?

It turns out that this is not a new problem.

When the Ford Model T was introduced in September 1908, it had a knob by the steering column which could select gasoline (Petrol) or Alcohol as fuel. Pretty well all Historic cars could run on alcohol and reduce pollution.

It is extremely unlikely that anybody will produce a fuel specially for historic vehicles. However an 85% alcohol fuel E85 is already available in Europe for multi-fuel vehicles and there was a time when countries such as Brazil ran all vehicles on 100% alcohol derived from sustainable wood, until petrol became cheaper.

So maybe there is a low pollution, non-electric, sustainable future not only for historic vehicles but for others as well.

This is yet another 'watch this space' issue.





Home Energy Support Team Alton - HESTA

Have you been thinking about improving the energy efficiency of your home, but are not sure where to start? Saving energy means saving money, having a more comfortable home and reducing your carbon impact.

Energy Alton, a volunteer-run community group, is launching a new project to make it easier for residents to get advice on what they can do and to then actually get it done. Home Energy Support Team Alton (HESTA) is funded by East Hampshire District Council and Alton Town Council. All the advice and support provided by Energy Alton is free of charge and there is no selling involved.

Energy Alton volunteers have provided over 500 free energy surveys over the last 10 years. They have found that one of the biggest challenges for residents wanting to have energy saving measures installed is finding someone to actually do it.

HESTA includes a list of several local handypeople who can install loft insulation, secondary glazing, draught proofing and other measures. HESTA also provides grants of up to £100 towards the cost, for properties in council tax bands A, B, C or D.

Volunteer Green Home Champions are also available to talk to for advice. These are local people who have already had energy saving measures installed, who are happy to share their experience so that you can find out the benefits, challenges and lessons learned from someone who has already started making their home more sustainable.

An update from the Parish of the Resurrection Eco Church Team

As the Parish of the Resurrection Eco Church Team, we continue to work alongside other local organisations as part of our 'Community and Global engagement'. This month, we were interviewed by a member of ACAN (Alton Climate Action Network) under the heading of 'Making a Difference' and we thought that you would like to read what they wrote about us. The article below is reproduced with the author's permission.



'God has created us to look after all that He has made.'

This quotation from the book of Genesis encapsulates the philosophy behind Eco Church, a national initiative adopted in 2019 by Alton's Parish of the Resurrection (POTR). To quote a spokesperson: 'As Christians, we believe we have a Godgiven duty to care for Creation.'

Covering five key areas of church life, Eco Church encourages congregations across all denominations to engage in learning about and implementing actions to care for God's earth, and the Parish of the Resurrection churches (Alton's St Lawrence and All Saints, the Church of the Holy Rood and St Peter's in Beech) have embraced this wholeheartedly.

Their first step was to examine what they had already done and then look at possible next steps. In the 'Worship and Teaching' section, for example, they noted that they were holding prayer stations during COPs and holding an annual Creation Care service. The next stage includes introducing a series of talks on carbon literacy and social justice.

In the 'Management of Church Buildings' section, they had already switched to green energy suppliers, installed LED lighting, and turned down their thermostats, with the replacement of a boiler in Holy Rood high on the agenda for the future.

Under 'Management of Church Land' they had installed a water butt in the Holy Rood churchyard, cooperated with ACAN, AVLAN, and others to build a wildflower garden at All Saints, conducted biodiversity surveys in St Lawrence and Holy Rood, and started to green St Lawrence churchyard by planting bulbs and establishing a wildflower bed. They now plan to follow the advice of the Alton Natural History Society to improve biodiversity, by planting more wildflower gardens and installing bird boxes and bat boxes.

The 'Community and Global engagement' section saw them holding a stall at ACAN's COP26 vigil in the Market Square, participating in our two Eco Fairs, and hosting our 'Listen to the Children' exhibition. At Christmas 2022 they held a Greener Christmas event, examining ways of making Christmas more environmentally friendly. To avoid waste, as well as to help people's pockets, they host and help at ACAN's Community Share scheme at which children's toys and games can be borrowed at no cost, they have held craft swaps and toy bonanzas and plan to hold more of these. In addition, they have contributed donations from their events to various local, national and international charities. Cooperation with other local churches under GAP (the Greater Alton Project) also takes place.

Eco Church's cooperation with ACAN groups continues under their 'Lifestyle' heading. A 'travel to church' survey established individual parishioners' carbon footprints and encourages people to walk or cycle to church where it is practical to do so. After consulting Cycle Alton, they installed cycle racks at three of their churches. Other ACAN groups have benefited from their participation too: Repair Café, Litter Picks, and Energy Alton, to name just a few, have all welcomed Eco Church members.

At the hub of Eco Church is a small, dedicated group of enthusiasts who take on the responsibility of organizing and promoting events and initiatives. They have been gratified by the positive response from the rest of the congregation; environmental awareness has been raised and many others have become involved in the various activities. 'Every little helps' is their attitude, and they are pleased to see that so many other parishioners join in as far as available time or resources allow.

The Eco Church structure includes receiving awards at certain stages of the program's completion. In May 2020 POTR Eco Church received the Bronze Award and hopes to achieve silver in the next few months. They acknowledge the recognition that the awards bring and celebrate the way they raise awareness, both of their work and of the wider issues around environmental damage and the climate crisis. But much more important to them is that caring for God's Creation should be embedded in their daily lives.

They quote Archbishop Desmond Tutu, who said: 'Do your little bit where you are; it's those little bits of good put together that overwhelm the world.'


