Dear friends

A knee-high plastic Jesus (apparently) was on a shelf beside a similarly sized Santa Claus in September. I looked at them both, feeling rather nonplussed, the sun was shining, the leaves on the trees were still green and here were plastic reminders that Christmas was coming, though three months away!

Christmas is much nearer now and I expect we are getting caught up in the busyness of the season, probably involving fun, food and parties, present buying and wrapping. As we go through Advent toward Christmas Day we reflect on the promises of scripture that Messiah would come to his people to 'set them free', and look forward to celebrating the arrival of Jesus our saviour, on Christmas day.

From the author of the Bible and Romans Courses, Andrew Ollerton, *The Bible: A story that makes sense of Life.*



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Review of 'Music for an Autumn Afternoon' Alton Choral Society Concert: Saturday 26th October St Mary's Church Bentworth

Alton Choral society gave it's annual 'Music for an Autumn Afternoon' concert at St Mary's Church, Bentworth on Saturday 26th October. The concert was part of a series of events held to celebrate the recent refurbishment of St Mary's which includes a new kitchen, toilet facilities, state of the art lighting and new wooden flooring.

The choir directed by Wendy Busby and accompanied by Jane Palmer, delighted a large audience with a choral medley from Les Miserables by Claude Michel Schonberg and a collection of West end hits by Andrew Lloyd Webber.

There were also solo performances by Soprano Alison Crow singing 'Here amongst the Shady Woods' By Handel and 'By Strauss' by Gershwin. The second Handel aria 'How Beautiful are the Feet' from The Messiah was sung by alto Nancy Buck. In keeping with the autumn theme, Bass David Sheraton sang Vaughan William's arrangement of Linden Lea. Pianist Patrick Busby followed this with Franz Liszt's Concert Paraphrase on Rigoletto which is a stunning reinvention of the tune to the Verdi aria 'Bella filglia dell'amore.

Over £700 was raised through the raffle and ticket sales. Some of the proceeds from the concert will be given to local charity 'Dementia Friendly Alton'.

Alton Choral Society's next concert will be 'The Wonder of Christmas' in The Alton Maltings Centre at 7pm on Saturday 7th December in aid of Homestart. They will be joined by Alton's excellent concert Band and Ancora female voice choir, for what promises to be a great and lively musical start to the Christmas period.

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Angels

In this magazine last month there was an article which mentioned angels and numbers; it evoked some conversation and thought. It seemed appropriate to me that I should do some of my own thinking and see what I understand as I read the Bible. Angels are mentioned a lot in the Bible - about 300 times - both in the Old and New Testament. The Bible is what drives our Christian Church culture. Our secular culture has an angel problem. Lots of people talk about angels - guardian angels, greetings card contain them, they get talked about on TV shows, they are given numbers, we call people 'an angel', we try and depict them in art. And all of this is often different to the picture of angels that emerges in the Bible.

So I thought I might clear up a few things - this is what I have discovered. **Angels are comforting**. There's a reason nearly every time angels appear to humans in scripture, the angel begins by saying, "Be not afraid." They come to bring good news even in the midst of what might seem tragedy, confusion and disorder.

Angels are not cute winged-people, with lots of smiles and halos. So what do they look like? It depends on what form they take. Sometimes they look very much like a human being - I think Gabriel did that or we don't even recognise them as in Hebrews 13:2) - and other descriptions are a little more bizarre (read Ezekiel 1).

Angels are not dead people who have somehow got a promotion. Sometimes you hear people say something to the effect, of, "When so-and-so died, I'm sure they became an angel." No. Angels are beings in the created order, quite different from humans. Angels are as much like people as people are like dolphins. Sure, we're all made by God. But angels are heavenly beings with different tasks than those given to humans - read Psalm 8.

The Bible does not talk about guardian angels. Yes, angels sometimes help out humans. But they are doing this at God's bidding. God is the real guardian. There is certainly nothing in the Bible which would suggest that angels are assigned one-on-one to watch over particular people.

Angels lead worship. They sing a lot - mainly 'Holy, holy, holy' and in the very presence of God. In our worship we emulate them as we join our voices with angels and archangels in our celebrations of Communion. They sing out God's praise in the heavenly throng which is sometimes heard by certain people like the shepherds on the hillside in the Christmas story.

But the primary task of angels on earth is to carry messages for God. They are his messengers. Most of the time when angels appear, it's to bring news. Usually this is stunning news but also can be a warning. Think of the occasions

in our Nativity story! Gabriel with Mary and then Joseph and it just keeps on happening. Angels sometimes lead people on - think of Jesus leaving the temptation of the desert - "the Devil left him, and suddenly angels came and waited on him". Angels seem to be appear in dreams quite a lot. So maybe we need to be more aware of those prompts and messages which come in our sleeping moments.

Next time you have a few minutes, read about angels. You'll find yourself in Genesis, Isaiah, the Psalms, Ezekiel, Daniel, the Gospels, and Revelation among other places.

Then please celebrate angels. They are not creatures for fear or for dark practices. They have amazing news. They deliver messages that tell us about God and his purposes. That is good news.

LET YOUR LIGHT SHINE

I am sure there is more, but for now I hope this helps.

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Dear friends

This has been a traumatic time for the Church of England following the publication of the Makin Report into the appalling serial abuse done by John Smyth over a number of years before his death in 2018. The horror of reading what happened pales into insignificance when you consider the trauma of those who were abused and the ongoing scars both mental and physical it has left on the victims and survivors. We should be appalled that this was done in the name of God - a God we know as compassionate, gracious and abounding in steadfast love. The report makes abundantly clear that there were many failings by a number of people - they knew, had suspicions and were either silent, didn't follow correct safeguarding procedures or maintain a level of curiosity in what was happening. Consequently some have stood back from ministry, others are being asked to consider their positions and The Archbishop of Canterbury has resigned. Personally I think it is right that he has done so. He has taken the institutional blame as well as for his own inaction. Yet I ask you to remember him and his family in your prayers in what must be a really difficult time for them Please also pray for his colleagues at Lambeth and those Bishops and others who will need to take on extra duties. Please, particularly, pray for our own Bishop of Winchester as he leads us here in the Diocese where John Smyth's abuse took place before he left for Zimbabwe and South Africa. The absolute focus of our prayers need to be all those who have suffered abuse by John Smyth and those who are affected by this distressing situation.

How do we respond? First is to be join the call to prayer. Second is to repent for our own inactions and silence at injustice. Third is to stay vitally vigilant - watch, listen, have curiosity, report. Fourth is to regard safeguarding as everyone's responsibility - that's you and me. If you have any concerns then talk to Sally Safeguarding Kemp our Parish Officer (07944 or potr.safeguarding@gmail.com) or to the Diocesan Safeguarding Team, (01962 737317 safeguarding@winchester.anglican.org) or local authority (0300 555 1386), or if an emergency call 999. Fifth is to remain steadfast in the faith - Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church and he hasn't resigned! He reigns in the everlasting Kingdom - Thanks be to Him! And lastly, is to keep that message of Jesus alive. Even though this is a turbulent time, with trauma and great sadness, Jesus is our hope and great is his faithfulness.

This is one of my favourite hymns and it seems appropriate.

Great is Thy faithfulness, O God my Father; there is no shadow of turning with Thee; Thou changest not, Thy compassions, they fail not; as Thou hast been, Thou forever wilt be.

Great is Thy faithfulness! Great is Thy faithfulness!

Morning by morning new mercies I see; all I have needed Thy hand hath provided: great is Thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me!

Summer and winter, and springtime and harvest; sun, moon, and stars in their courses above join with all nature in manifold witness to Thy great faithfulness, mercy, and love.

Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth,
Thine own dear presence to cheer and to guide;
strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow:
blessings all mine, with ten thousand beside!

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
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


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Donation To Anna Chaplaincy



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
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Notes from a "Manic" Christmas Choir
