First thoughts

Dear friends.

As signs of spring are beginning to show in the garden and precious daylight time is extending, I've been thinking about other hints of hope; the hints of hope that we might have heard in December at Christmas services.

A common quiz question is 'Guess the novel with this opening quote' and you might recognise this one;

"It is a truth universally acknowledged, that a single man in possession of a good fortune, must be in want of a wife",

These are the well-known opening words from Jane Austen's novel 'Pride and Prejudice'. I wonder how often we hear the familiar start of a book but don't follow the narrative to its' less well-known, end?

Only about a month ago, many of us heard well-known words from the beginning of a much older book, "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was made flesh...and dwelt among us..." Those words from start of the Gospel of John continue on, to recount wonderful things about the Word (Jesus) who lived amongst his people, who did and said truly amazing things.

Mark's gospel is the shortest of the four and a great one to read through by Easter or before. It is shorter to read than 'Pride and Prejudice', yet it involves both pride and prejudice! Its' central figure, Jesus, God with us, shows his love in word and deed with compassion and power for the good of many people. Following the gospel story to the end, shows us the immense love of God for us, through the cross and resurrection of Jesus and the blessing that that will be for all who will receive his message.

As we approach Lent and Easter, let us pick up the 'God story' of his activity among us today in our villages and town, in all our communities. May I propose you read Mark's gospel, completing the story we began at Christmas. May it bring you hope, joy and peace as you read about Jesus, the one who came and dwelt amongst us. And let us enjoy both the signs of Spring in the hedgerows and the reasons for hope in the Bible!

Message from Andrew

This announcement was made in our church services recently and I want to share it widely with you.

Following an application and interview, the Bishop of Winchester has offered me, and I have accepted, the post of Canon Treasurer at Winchester Cathedral. This is subject to the due processes of references and safeguarding formalities. This is a full time stipendiary position in which I will have responsibilities to oversee the work of the Learning Team, to enhance the Cathedral's role as Mother Church in the diocese, to share oversight of the communications function of the cathedral, and to work with the cathedral guides in their work of outreach — alongside the ministry of leading services and preaching, hospitality and welcome.

I will be installed at the Cathedral in a Service of Evensong on Saturday 5th April at 3.30pm. My last service here in The Parish of the Resurrection and Bentworth, Lasham & Shalden is likely to be on Sunday 9th March.

Please join me in praying for us as a family as we make this transition; for the Cathedral and its Chapter as they continue their ministry; for those who will work with Bishop David and our Archdeacon, Richard Brand, in finding and appointing a new vicar for our worshipping community here; and for God's kingdom to grow throughout.

This does not affect Fiona's position as Headteacher of St Lawrence CE Primary School – so you will still see her around. I know that we have a good and strong Ministry Team who will serve you well through the vacancy and into the future.

Thank you for all your love and support over what has been nearly 11 years. As a family, we have always felt immensely privileged to be on our Christian journey together with all of you. I am looking forward to the opportunities this new post at the Cathedral has to offer me in my ongoing ministry but I am sad that it means leaving such wonderful church communities and so many friends.

She has spent time with people at crucial moments in their lives, has always been ready with a listening ear and pastoral heart, has prepared numerous thought provoking sermons and has enjoyed her many sessions with children and toddlers in church and school. So we say thank you Lynn. We will enjoy seeing you around. Don't become a stranger – in fact you are a good neighbour to us all.

Retirement.

On Sunday 25th September 2016 I was licensed to the Parish of the Resurrection by Bishop David in a Songs of Praise service in St Peter's Beech. Little was I to know that this would be the beginning of a special relationship with that community and the wider parish of POTR (and more recently BLS and St Nicholas' Chawton) that has lasted nearly 9 years. Two days before this I was licensed as chaplain of Treloar School and College in a very different but equally precious service. I will treasure this latter role forever and only regret that I didn't come to it earlier in life. I remember going to look round Treloar's and realising that this was the place that God was calling me to serve in.

Having served my curacy in the neighbouring North Hampshire Downs benefice and with a certain Revd. Andrew Micklefield as my pastoral tutor, a move to Alton was meant to be. Initially I worked (in addition to Treloar's) as the schools' minister, employed by GAP. I quickly made contact with our many schools and helped to set up Open the Book groups, Service After School at All Saints and a prayer support network culminating in a 'Pray for Schools Service'. Working across the parish and Treloar's I encouraged and facilitated the Treloar's students attendance at Church at 4.

Whilst trained as a secondary Religious Studies teacher, I have found great joy in working with younger children and devising worship services and activities for them. Encouraged by Sarah Broadbent, I helped to run the Teddies' group, which I still do today with our eldest daughter. I love the honesty and wonder of the young mind as they start to learn about Jesus and his love for all.

When I retired from Treloar's just before the pandemic, I was able to play a more regular role in parish ministry assuming pastoral responsibility for St Peter's. I feel that my calling has always been shaped by chaplaincy. Coming alongside people in times of need and as a consequence the occasional offices of baptism, marriage and funerals have always been special as has just listening to and being with people.

As some of you know the last six months have been quite challenging as a routine and successful cataract operation has left me with severe dry and sore eyes that has made reading for any length of time a strain. This, plus growing family commitments, has led to my decision to retire from parish ministry. I am hugely thankful for all those who have supported me especially Sarah Neish, Andrew and the Ministry Team (both past and present). I will continue my work in the cathedral where I serve as, and head up, the volunteer chaplains and where I get to simply welcome, be and pray with whoever, as Bishop Trevor once said, God blows in through the doors.

Eco Corner

When I took the Eco Corner over from the late Bob Weighton, the issues centered round things which technically might be done to combat Global Warming. Choices of the most promising technologies have now been made. Climate Change has now become much more a political subject, following the Government's publication of a Clean Power 2030 Action Planwith a target of 100% clean power by 2030.

So, how are we doing? Currently, 58% of our energy comes from clean sources - our highest ever figure but way below the 100% target. 16.1 Gigawatts (Gw) comes from offshore wind but that needs to go up to 43-50 Gw. Battery storage capacity need to go up from 4.0 Gw to 23-27 and, like it or not we will need to retain a reserve of gas power to cover dmand until other sources have been expanded. We should not forget that the Grid will require major upgrading. These sorts of changes require a huge investment of effort and avoidance of the planning delays currently occurring.

A wide range of independent sources have been consulted to obtain a view on whether this transformation is really achievable. Experts agree that 95% clean is just about managable, the last 5% being highly unlikely.

However, taking a motoring analogy, getting there on time will require the brakes to be taken off, the accelerator to be floored and motorway tail-backs removed.






St Lawrence Flower Team
